Education Materials for Schools in Nepal



Binod Neupane, one of our staff in the Science Department at Thomas Tallis, established his own school in Nepal in 1995 where he was the Head Teacher for 12 years.

After coming to the UK in 2006, Binod set up a UK based charity in 2008 called 'Save the School Foundation'.

Through his charity he has managed to replace over 200 blackboards with modern whiteboards in deprived areas of Nepal, set up a library (with enough textbooks for all students taking A-levels) and raise enough money for a school to receive two computers and one projector. The charity provides stationery for 500 students every year.
